**CAUTION TO HAWKERS.**—Ann Carroll was summoned for hawking without a certificate in the township of Somerford Booths. He was selling goods about a mile from the Staffordshire border.

**THE ELEMENTARY EDUCATION ACT.**—Mr. Joseph Brocklehurst, the school attendance officer for the county, brought the following cases before the Bench:—An attendance order was granted for Thomas Jepson, Smallwood, his daughter, Jane Jepson, having attended Smallwood school very irregularly.—An attendance order was also granted against Charles Minshall, Smallwood, to secure the regular attendance of his son, James Boswell Minshall, at school. Defendant promised to send him to the National Schools at Kids Grove.—A similar order was made against Edward Norbury, Smallwood, for the attendance of his two children at Brereton and Smallwood schools.—Abel Yates, Buglawton, was ordered to send his two girls, Annie and Hannah, regularly to St. John's School, Buglawton.

**DRUNK.**—Charles Hancock, of Odd Rode, was charged with being drunk and disorderly on the 8th inst., at Moreton. The prisoner had been previously charged with stealing a line-post from a field (which he said he did in a lark), and this case was, therefore, withdrawn.—He was fined 10s., and 2s. costs.—Mr. Henry Latham defended the accused.
